

An Analysis of Fall 2019 and Spring 2020 All ISU Bachelor Degree Recipients

Who are the ISU Recently Degreed Students?

This analysis of the Fall 2019 and Spring 2020 bachelor degree recipients provides a profile of successful completers. Below are some highlights.

19-20 Bachelor's Degree Recipients were:

- * 59% Female
- * 13% African American
- * 26% First Generation College Students
- * 9% on probation at least one time
- * 2% dismissed at least 1 time
- * 69% Started as First-Time-Freshman
- * 54% Starting as First-Time-Freshman changed to a new major department at least once
- * 4% Starting as First-Time-Freshman were Conditionally Admitted

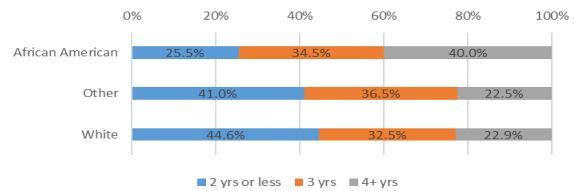

Demographic Influences on Time-To-Degree

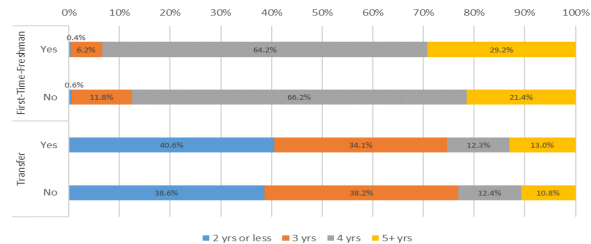
* There are some common factors that impacted how long it took the 2019-20 Bachelor degree recipients to achieve their degree, regardless of whether they started as first-time-freshman or transfer students. African-American, male, and Pell recipient degreed students took longer to receive their degree than other groups, even after accounting for the number of hours transferred from other institutions

* However, First-Generation status had differential results based upon their initial ISU entry. First-Generation bachelor recipients who started as first-time-freshmen took longer to obtain their degree than those who were not First-Generation, but First-Generation status did not result in a difference in TTD for those who entered as a transfer student.

Performance and Attendance Influences on Time-to-Degree

* On time graduation was more likely for degree recipients who started ISU with more transfer credits, with 10 or more College Challenge Hours, or those who attended at least one summer session.

* It took students longer to obtain their bachelors degree if they had a change in major, if they were on academic probation or dismissed. However, they were successful in receiving their degree.
